### 1.2. Socio-economic Profile

Nairobi province has:

- The highest urban population in Kenya.
- The highest population density.
- A young population structure.
- The highest monthly mean household income in the country and the least number of malnourished children
- More than 50% of the population living in absolute poverty
- High inequalities by class and other social economic variables
- Very low primary and secondary school enrollments
- Poor access to safe drinking water and sanitation

Nairobi has eight constituencies. It has been an overwhelmingly opposition stronghold. In the 1997 parliamentary elections, opposition parties took up 7 out of 8 seats. In 1997, Nairobi seats were competitively contested by the main political parties leading to low victory margins for the eventual winners. DP won 5 of the 8 Nairobi seats then. Each MP represents approximately 267,907 persons, occupying an estimated 87 Km<sup>2</sup>.

## 2. CONSITUENCY PROFILE

This is the former Mathare Constituency, renamed Kasarani after 1996. it consists of Kariobangi North sub-location of Kariobangi location; Ruaraka and Kasarani sub location of Ruaraka Location; Roysambu sub location of Roysambu location; Kahawa South and Kahawa North sub-location of Kahawa Location of Nairobi area.

## 2.2. Socio-Economic Profile

Kasarani is one of the poorest electoral areas in Kenya comprising of the highly populated slums of Mathare, Huruma, Kariobangi and, Korogocho. Most of the residents in this area are employed in the public or private sectors. There is also a lot of commerce related activities in form of trading and jua kali activities. The income of most of the residents is low as evidenced in the type of housing.

## 2.3. Electioneering and Political Information

This constituency is predominantly an opposition zone. As evidenced during past elections, the candidates' ethnic background, charisma and record of accomplishments play an important role in determining the electoral outcome. Like the rest of Nairobi Constituencies, the opposition since 1992 has always worn the seat. In 2002, the National Rainbow Coalition took the seat.

## 2.8. Main Problems

Problems include unemployment, insecurity and lack of access roads. There is also the issue of

poor sanitary conditions and disease outbreaks including the HIV pandemic. Other issues are inadequate health facilities, clean water and descent housing, all of which are lacking.

### 3. CONSTITUTION MAKING/REVIEW PROCESS

#### 3.1. Constituency Constitutional Forums (CCFs)

##### 3.1.1. Philosophy

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) plays a very significant role in the review of the constitution. It is designated as one of the organs ‘through which the review process shall be conducted’ - (sec. 4(1) of the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, Cap.3A). The importance attached to the CCF arises from the recognition of the need to involve the people fully in the review of the constitution. Only through such participation of the public will the new constitution reflect the preferences, hopes and aspirations of the people. It would also increase people’s knowledge of constitutional issues, and facilitate their familiarity with the provisions of the new constitution. Additionally, the process, enhances the legitimacy of the constitution among Kenyans and their sense of ownership over it. In these ways the proper implementation and safeguarding of the constitution will be facilitated.

##### 3.1.2. Composition and Establishment

The 1997 Review Act had provided for district forums ‘to mobilize communities at the local level for the purpose of civic education in preparation for the Commission’s work and to perform such other duties as the Commission may assign’ - (sec. 12A (6)). The District Forums were to consist of members elected to represent locations, religious organizations, and the disabled, in addition to MPs and members of every local authority in the district. The Act contained several provisions prescribing minimum qualifications for membership and regulating the operations of the District Forums.

The Select Committee of the National Assembly, which reviewed the Act in early 2000, decided to replace the District Forums with Constituency Forums to get views ‘directly from the people in the constituency without necessarily going through the rigours of an election to determine the members of the forum’. It thought that this would provide for a more popular form of participation. It recommended on the simplification of the forum to avoid elections. The Select Committee envisaged the constituency forum as an ‘open forum with no specific structures’, which should be ‘flexible and easy to manage’. Its opinion was that the ‘existing leadership comprising Members of Parliament, councilors, community based organizations, religious groups and individuals should be able to present views and opinions directly from the grassroots’ ( *The Report of the Parliamentary Select Committee Reviewing the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, 1997*, April 2000). It removed the regulatory powers of the Commission over the forum, its role being confined to the ‘facilitation’ of the forum. It also changed the function of the forum from the facilitation of civic education to also include facilitation and the collection of the views of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In view of the limited role of the CKRC in the establishment of the CCF’s, the CKRC prepared and gazetted Guidelines for the operationalization of the constituency constitutional forums. The Guidelines stipulated that all the residents of a constituency would constitute the CCF. The CCF is described as one of the organs ‘through which the review process shall be conducted’ - (sec.4(1)). The CCF was thus one of the principal ways in which the views of the public were to be obtained.

In order to coordinate and facilitate the activities of the CCF, a Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) was to be established. The Guidelines proposed its membership to consist of 10 persons, of which three would be ex-officio: the local MP, the chair of the County Council in which the constituency is located, and the District Coordinator. The Guidelines stated that the membership would be as broad and representative of the people of the constituency as possible and recommended that at least a third of the committee should be women.

### 3.1.3. **Functions of CCF**

- Facilitation of collection of the views of the public at the constituency level on proposals to alter the constitution; and
- Debate and discussion of the views of the members of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In performance of these functions, the CKRC was required to visit all constituencies (Sec.18 (1)(a)).

### 3.1.4. **Functions of CCC**

- The functions of the CCC were mainly facilitative and advisory, the primary aim being to enhance the effective participation in the ownership of the constitution review process by the people at the constituency level;
- The CCC was also mandated to promote, facilitate and monitor civic education at the constituency level in collaboration with the District Coordinator and civic education providers;
- Additionally, the CCC had to ensure that the constituency had access to all information relevant to the review process in coordination with District Documentation centers; and
- Finally, the CCC was also mandated with the task of dissemination of the report of the CKRC. It was to be assisted in this by the District Coordinator, who was also its accounting officer, in relation to funds that were made available to it by CKRC.

It is important to emphasize that the Guidelines were advisory, and the local community was free to modify them to suit local circumstances. For example, the size of the CCC could be increased when and if adequate representation and diversity required it.



### **3.1.5. Date of Commencement of Work**

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) was to run for an initial period commencing November 2001 up to September 2002. Accordingly, each Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) should have been constituted at the very latest by the end of November 2001. The Constituency Constitutional Forum was to be operational by that time.

### **3.2. District Coordinators**

#### **3.2.1. Mandate/Terms of Reference**

- Be the local grass root representative;
- Perform the generalization activities in the district;
- Be in charge of the documentation center/s in the district, facilitate its/their respective management, ensuring they are stocked and are easily accessible to the public and also organize their safety and security;
- Gathering any relevant local information and materials for the purpose of constitution making;
- Facilitate the identification, classification and organization of the physical and electronic retrieval and dissemination of information and materials for constitution making;
- Supply such information needed by local constituency forums and committees;
- Liaise with other documentation centers nearby and others for information;
- In collaboration with constituency committees, identify and arrange venues for public hearing whenever the CKRC visits the constituencies in their area;
- Facilitate regular meetings of the constituency committees and involve local people as much as possible in discussing constitutional issues;
- Source and identify other key personnel that the CKRC may wish to consult or engage in its work;
- Identify and arrange for simultaneous local translations, sign language users, procurement and hiring of public address systems, transport and communication facilities for CKRC's meetings in the district;
- Monitor the implementation of civic education by civic education providers in the district;
- Facilitate the formation of constituency committees with guidance and assistance of CKRC; and
- Perform any other tasks as directed by CKRC.

#### **3.2.2. Criteria for Appointment**

- Diversity in the composition, taking into account ethnicity, age, religion and professional or occupational background; and
- Appointees had at least attained Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education or its equivalent.

## **4. CIVIC EDUCATION**

Civic education was carried out in the constituency between 2<sup>nd</sup> February and 6<sup>th</sup> June 2002.

### **4.1. Phases covered in Civil Education**

Stage 1 - Is the only phase that has adequately been covered. This is the stage preceding the

collection of views. This stage dealt with information, knowledge, skills and virtues that enabled Kenyans to make informed choices and present their views on constitutional review.

### 5.3. Concerns and Recommendations

The following are the recommendations made by the presenters in Kasarani Constituency. The recommendations were collated around 43 areas of concern, from the Preamble to National integrity/identity. Only areas where recommendations were made in the constituency are covered. The numbers in parentheses represent the number of times the recommendation (bulleted) was made, either orally or through written memoranda. Each count on a specific recommendation was picked from an individual, a group or an organization. Where a presenter made different recommendations on the same area of concern, each recommendation was counted separately. Where no number appears in parentheses, the recommendation was made only once.

#### 5.3.1. PREAMBLE TO THE CONSTITUTION

- The constitution should have a preamble (12)

The constitution should have a preamble:

- With the phrase “We the people of Kenya...”
- Reflecting the common vision of all Kenyans (2)
- Reflecting a vision towards poverty alleviation
- Reflecting a vision of a just government

- With a vision of a peaceful and prosperous nation
- Which includes the role of freedom fighters.
- Stating that the constitution belongs to the people of Kenya who are its custodians.

### 5.3.2. **DIRECTIVE PRINCIPLES OF STATE POLICY**

The constitution should:

- Capture our national philosophy and guiding principles (4)
- Enhance unity and direct that there shall be no divisions along tribal lines
- Be enforced and all Kenyans shall adhere to it
- Direct that all Kenyans are under the law
- Include unity, justice, liberty, equality and hard work as some of the guiding principles. (2)
- Provide for democratic principles which allow the people to be involved in the making of state policies (4)
- Provide for a democratic government within the framework of pluralistic democracy and good governance (3)
- Promulgate equality of all in distribution of resources and development, peaceful settlement of conflicts. Multiparty democracy and the need to fight poverty, disease and ignorance
- Provide for the sovereignty of the republic to be vested on the public
- Include socio-cultural beliefs, norms and equality reflecting how these institutions are set up and how powerful they are
- Provide for state policies to have clear ethical and political principles enforceable in law
- Provide for all organs of the government to be equally powerful
- Provide for the procedures and aspirations of the people to be enforced by law

### 5.3.3. **CONSTITUTIONAL SUPREMACY**

The constitution should:

- Provide that a constitutional amendment be done through a public referendum (12).
- Emphasize that parliament shall not have the power to amend the constitution. (4)
- Retain that any amendment to the constitution requires a 65% vote in parliament
- Provide that any amendment to the constitution requires a 66 % vote in parliament
- Provide that any amendment to the constitution requires a 75% vote in parliament
- Provide for a national referendum after every 2 successive governments
- Provide that referendums shall be carried out by the attorney general
- Provide that referendums shall be carried out by the judicial arm of the government

### 5.3.4. **CITIZENSHIP**

- Citizenship should be easily attainable by all Kenyans.
- The national identity card should be the document of evidence of citizenship and shall be issued on production of birth or baptismal certificate. (9)
- The constitution should abolish ID cards as proof of citizenship
- The passport should be the document of evidence of citizenship (12)
- The birth certificate should be the document of evidence of citizenship (3)
- Children born of Kenyan parents regardless of the parent's residence should be entitled to automatic citizenship (15).

- Dual citizenship should not be encouraged. (2)
- The constitution should allow for dual citizenship (5)
- Spouses of Kenyan citizens regardless of gender are entitled to confer citizenship. (8)
- The constitution should confer automatic citizenship only to those whose parents are Kenyans
- The constitution should confer automatic citizenship to an individual born in Kenya (5)
- The constitution should confer automatic citizenship by naturalization and registration (4)
- The constitution should confer automatic citizenship through dedication
- The constitution should confer automatic citizenship to anyone running a legal business in Kenya
- The constitution should promote and protect the rights of refugees (2)

### 5.3.5. **DEFENCE AND NATIONAL SECURITY**

The constitution should:

- Provide for an independent ministry of defence
- Provide for the government to provide every location with a vehicle to improve patrols
- Protect the public against police harassment
- Provide for police patrols to start after 10 PM
- Provide for the extension of training and education for all the disciplined forces to at least 3 years
- Provide for discipline within the disciplined forces without any form of prejudice or discrimination (4)
- Provide for proper training and education for police officers (5)
- Provide for military training for all school leavers to enhance discipline among the citizens (2)
- Provide for security officers to carry firearms after their probation period
- The armed forces should maintain the present disciplinary process and the paramilitary that existed during the colonial era should be abolished
- Provide for a code of conduct and regulation for all disciplined forces
- Provide that the armed forces be answerable to parliament (2)
- Provide for security of tenure for the director of CID and the commissioner of police
- Provide for the abolishment of the post of administration police
- Provide that police officers be given security of tenure in order to increase security
- Provide more powers to the police commissioner
- Provide for the independence of the military with the commander in chief from the military
- Provide for the president to remain the commander in chief of the armed forces (7)
- Provide that the president shall consult parliament before declaring war (2)
- Provide that the president shall have full power to declare war (2)
- Abolish court martial
- Empower the military to generate its own income
- Abolish the GSU
- Provide for human rights training for police officers (2)
- Provide for the recruitment of retired police officer
- Provide that police officers identify themselves before effecting an arrest
- Provide that a state of emergency can only be declared by the executive, but after 30 days, the national assembly becomes responsible for internal and external security
- Provide that a state of emergency can be declared by the president in case of natural disasters

(3)

- Provide that a state of emergency can be declared by citizens
- Provide that a state of emergency be declared by parliament (8)
- Limit the use of extraordinary power in public gatherings (2)
- Not limit the use of extraordinary power in cases of emergency situations (2)
- Provide that a state of emergency can only be declared by parliament
- Provide that the police should treat all people equally
- Provide for conviction of police officers who commit crimes (5)
- Provide for the provision of a police post in every residential area
- Provide for a police to public ratio of 1:10
- Provide that a police officer must have a minimum of o-level education
- Privatize the police force. (2)
- Provide for army barracks in every province
- Overhaul the police act
- Guarantee adequate security for all people
- Provide for a body to oversee the army and police

### 5.3.6. **POLITICAL PARTIES**

The constitution should:

- Confine the work of political parties to political mobilization (2)
- Not regulate the formation, management and conduct of political parties.
- Provide for political parties to assist the government in disseminating policies on how the country to be run (3)
- Provide for all political parties to have a national outlook (2)
- Provide for political parties to be registered only when they have adequate representation in parliament (4)
- Provide for political parties to be registered only if they have a membership of at least 60% from all 42 tribes of Kenya
- Provide broad guidelines for the formation, management and conduct of political parties. (4)
- Not allow leaders of Labour unions to join political parties
- Provide for funding of political parties
- Limit the number of political parties in the country to 3 (4)
- Provide for funding of parties with more than 5 seats in parliament by the government
- Limit the number of political parties to 5
- Limit the number of political parties to minimize tribalism
- Limit the number of political parties in the country (3)
- Provide for political parties to be funded by the government. (15)
- Provide for the government to fund only political parties that have been operational for five years
- Provide for the government to fund only political parties that have submitted their financial reports to the auditor general
- Provide for the government to fund only political parties that have enough representation
- Provide for political parties to liaise with the state in matters that promote efficiency and economic growth
- Provide for equal media coverage to all political parties
- Provide that parties without parliamentary seat be deregistered

### 5.3.7. **STRUCTURES AND SYSTEMS OF GOVERNMENT**

- A parliamentary system of government headed by a prime minister should be established. (4)
- There should be a federal system of government. (9)
- The constitution should reject the federal system of government. (3)
- The constitution should not provide for a unitary system of government.
- There should be a hybrid system of government.
- The constitution should adopt a unitary system of government. (8)
- The constitution should come up with a provincial system of government, with each province producing a cabinet minister.
- The constitution should provide for a government with a ceremonial president and an elected prime minister who is an MP and head of government. (2)
- The constitution should provide for a post of prime minister as head of government. (4)
- The constitution should provide for the dissolution of power to lower levels of government to minimize bureaucracy. (6)
- The constitution should provide for 8 vice presidents instead of a prime minister.
- The constitution should provide for a socialist state.
- The constitution should provide that the vice president be chosen by the president.
- The constitution should retain the post of VP.
- The constitution should provide that vice presidents be elected. (3)
- The constitution should provide that vice presidents be appointed by parliament.
- The constitution should maintain the present system of president and vice president. (8)
- The constitution should limit the powers of the attorney general.
- The constitution should provide that the attorney general shall not have powers to terminate cases.
- The constitution should provide that the vice president shall be the president's running mate. (8)

### 5.3.8. **THE LEGISLATURE**

The constitution should:

- Provide that parliament be autonomous
- Provide for parliament to have at least a 2/3 representation of the disabled.
- Provide for parliament to approve the number of ministries with a 2/3-majority vote.
- Provide for an expansion of parliament's powers.
- Provide for parliament to appoint the cabinet.
- Provide for all presidential appointments to go through parliamentary approval. (3)
- Provide parliament with power to pass a vote of no confidence in the cabinet.
- Provide parliament with power to pass a vote of no confidence in the president. (4)
- Provide that the president shall have veto power on legislation passed by parliament. (3)
- Provide that the president shall have veto power to dissolve parliament (3)
- Debar parliament from electing the speaker of the national assembly.
- Provide for parliament to have its own calendar. (4)
- Provide for being a member of parliament to be a full time job.
- Provide for the age of parliamentary candidates to be at least 35 years.
- Provide for the age of parliamentary candidates to be between 21 and 55 years.
- Provide that there shall be age limit for the president.

- Provide for parliamentary candidates to have at least O'level education (8)
- Not allow the president to stagger the general elections.
- Allow for the staggering of the general elections so that only one third of the MPs vacate seats at any one given time.
- Provide for language tests for parliamentary candidates to be considered sufficient. (3)
- Provide for parliamentary candidates to have at least a University degree.
- Provide for parliamentary candidates to be fluent in the national language.
- Provide for parliamentary candidates to be fluent in more than one indigenous and the two national languages.
- Provide for moral and ethical qualifications for parliamentary candidates. (5)
- Provide for the age of presidential candidates to be between 40 to 60 years.
- Provide for the age of presidential candidates to be between 35 to 65 years.
- Provide for the age of presidential candidates to be between 30 to 60 years.
- Provide for the minimum age of presidential candidates to be 18 years.
- Provide for the age of presidential candidates to be above 63years.
- Maintain the current number of legislators.
