1.2 Socio-Economic Profile

Keiyo District:

- Is the 8th most densely populated district in the province;
- Has a primary school enrolment rate of 98.4%, being the leading in the province and ranked 3rd nationally;
- Has a secondary school enrolment rate of 51.8%, being the leading in the province and nationally;
- Experiences the following main diseases: Malaria, acute respiratory tract infections, diarrhoea diseases, intestinal worms, and eye infections; and
- Has a life expectancy of 61 years, being ranked 14th of 45 of the nationally ranked districts.
- Keiyo district has 6 constituencies: Keiyo North, and Keiyo South Constituencies. The district's 2 MPs, each cover on average an area of 720 Km² to reach 71,933 constituents. This is a KANU stronghold. In the 1992 and 1997 general elections, KANU representatives in the Keiyo North and Keiyo South constituencies won with 70.07% and 93.72% valid votes respectively.

2.6 Main Problems

- Unemployment;
- Clan rivalries and landlessness: The government has set aside forest areas in Kipkabus, Tigwa and Kibonge in order to settle the constituents. The two dominant clans cannot agree on who should be settled there. The issue has resulted in inter-clan stand-off in which houses have been burnt. In addition to this, there is controversy on families that were moved from their land in 1972 to pave way for the construction of the Kenya Fluospar Company complex. These families are yet to be compensated and there are claims that farms purchased to resettle them were put to private use;
- Poor access roads; and
- The need to uplift standards of education in the constituency.

3. CONSTITUTION MAKING/REVIEW PROCESS

3.1. Constituency Constitutional Forums (CCFs)

3.1.1. Philosophy

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) plays a very significant role in the review of the constitution. It is designated as one of the organs ‘through which the review process shall be conducted’ - (sec. 4(1) of the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, Cap.3A). The importance attached to the CCF arises from the recognition of the need to involve the people fully in the review of the constitution. Only through such participation of the public will the new constitution reflect the preferences, hopes and aspirations of the people. It would also increase people’s knowledge of constitutional issues, and facilitate their familiarity with the provisions of the new constitution. Additionally, the process, enhances the legitimacy of the constitution among Kenyans and their sense of ownership over it. In these ways the proper implementation and safeguarding of the constitution will be facilitated.

3.1.2. Composition and Establishment

The 1997 Review Act had provided for district forums ‘to mobilize communities at the local level for the purpose of civic education in preparation for the Commission’s work and to perform such other duties as the Commission may assign’ - (sec. 12A (6)). The District Forums were to consist of members elected to represent locations, religious organizations, and the disabled, in addition to MPs and members of every local authority in the district. The Act contained several provisions prescribing minimum qualifications for membership and regulating the operations of the District Forums.

The Select Committee of the National Assembly, which reviewed the Act in early 2000, decided to replace the District Forums with Constituency Forums to get views ‘directly from the people in the constituency without necessarily going through the rigours of an election to determine the members of the forum’. It thought that this would provide for a more popular form of participation. It recommended on the simplification of the forum to avoid elections. The Select Committee envisaged the constituency forum as and ‘open forum with no specific structures’, which should be ‘flexible and easy to manage’. Its opinion was that the ‘existing leadership comprising Members of Parliament, councilors, community based organizations, religious groups

and individuals should be able to present views and opinions directly from the grassroots' (*The Report of the Parliamentary Select Committee Reviewing the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, 1997*, April 2000). It removed the regulatory powers of the Commission over the forum, its role being confined to the 'facilitation' of the forum. It also changed the function of the forum from the facilitation of civic education to also include facilitation and the collection of the views of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In view of the limited role of the CKRC in the establishment of the CCF's, the CKRC prepared and gazetted Guidelines for the operationalization of the constituency constitutional forums. The Guidelines stipulated that all the residents of a constituency would constitute the CCF. The CCF is described as one of the organs ' through which the review process shall be conducted' - (sec.4(1)). The CCF was thus one of the principal ways in which the views of the public were to be obtained.

In order to coordinate and facilitate the activities of the CCF, a Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) was to be established. The Guidelines proposed its membership to consist of 10 persons, of which three would be ex-officio: the local MP, the chair of the County Council in which the constituency is located, and the District Coordinator. The Guidelines stated that the membership would be as broad and representative of the people of the constituency as possible and recommended that at least a third of the committee should be women.

3.1.3. **Functions of CCF**

- Facilitation of collection of the views of the public at the constituency level on proposals to alter the constitution; and
- Debate and discussion of the views of the members of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In performance of these functions, the CKRC was required to visit all constituencies (Sec.18 (1)(a)).

3.1.4. **Functions of CCC**

- The functions of the CCC were mainly facilitative and advisory, the primary aim being to enhance the effective participation in the ownership of the constitution review process by the people at the constituency level;
- The CCC was also mandated to promote, facilitate and monitor civic education at the constituency level in collaboration with the District Coordinator and civic education providers;
- Additionally, the CCC had to ensure that the constituency had access to all information relevant to the review process in coordination with District Documentation centers; and
- Finally, the CCC was also mandated with the task of dissemination of the report of the CKRC. It was to be assisted in this by the District Coordinator, who was also its accounting officer, in relation to funds that were made available to it by CKRC.

It is important to emphasize that the Guidelines were advisory, and the local community was free to modify them to suit local circumstances. For example, the size of the CCC could be increased when and if adequate representation and diversity required it.

3.1.5. **Date of Commencement of Work**

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) was to run for an initial period commencing November 2001 up to September 2002. Accordingly, each Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) should have been constituted at the very latest by the end of November 2001. The Constituency Constitutional Forum was to be operational by that time.

3.2. **District Coordinators**

3.2.1. **Mandate/Terms of Reference**

- Be the local grass root representative;
- Perform the generalization activities in the district;
- Be in charge of the documentation center/s in the district, facilitate its/their respective management, ensuring they are stocked and are easily accessible to the public and also organize their safety and security;
- Gathering any relevant local information and materials for the purpose of constitution making;
- Facilitate the identification, classification and organization of the physical and electronic retrieval and dissemination of information and materials for constitution making;
- Supply such information needed by local constituency forums and committees;
- Liase with other documentation centers nearby and others for information;
- In collaboration with constituency committees, identify and arrange venues for public hearing whenever the CKRC visits the constituencies in their area;
- Facilitate regular meetings of the constituency committees and involve local people as much as possible in discussing constitutional issues;
- Source and identify other key personnel that the CKRC may wish to consult or engage in its work;
- Identify and arrange for simultaneous local translations, sign language users, procurement and hiring of public address systems, transport and communication facilities for CKRC's meetings in the district;
- Monitor the implementation of civic education by civic education providers in the district;
- Facilitate the formation of constituency committees with guidance and assistance of CKRC; and
- Perform any other tasks as directed by CKRC.

3.2.2. **Criteria for Appointment**

- Diversity in the composition, taking into account ethnicity, age, religion and professional or occupational background; and
- Appointees **had at least attained Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education or its equivalent.**

4. **CIVIC EDUCATION.**

Civic education in the constitution was carried out between 5th December 2001 and 30th July 2002

4.1 Phases in civic education

Stage 1 is the only phase that has been covered. This is the stage preceding collection of views. This stage dealt with information, knowledge, skills and virtues that enabled Kenyans have an informed choice and present their views on constitutional review.

5.3 Concerns and Recommendations

The following are the recommendations made by the presenters in Keiyo South Constituency. The recommendations were collated around 43 areas of concern, from the Preamble to National integrity/identity. Only areas where recommendations were made in the constituency are covered. The numbers in parentheses represent the number of times the recommendation (bulleted) was made, either orally or through written memoranda. Each count on a specific recommendation was picked from an individual, a group or an organization. Where a presenter made different recommendations on the same area of concern, each recommendation was counted separately. Where no number appears in parentheses, the recommendation was made only once.

5.3.1 PREAMBLE

- The constitution should have a preamble.
- We need a preamble in our constitution.
- The struggle for independents should be reflected in the constitution.
- The constitution should salute the heroes of the struggle for independence and the desire to seek divine guidance in the affairs of the nation.
- The preamble should spell out that justice and the rule of the law must be paramount.
- The preamble should spell out our symbol of unity i.e. flag, court of arms executive president
- The preamble should capture love peace and unity among all ethnic groups in Kenya.
- The preamble should spell out a national philosophy.
- The preamble should spell out a Nyayo philosophy of patriotism and harambees spirit.
- The preamble should include the principles of democracy, justice, liberty, patriotism and equality.
- The preamble should state the number of tribes in Kenya and the mother tongues of all

communities and the national anthem

- The constitution should capture a brief history of Kenya and also a brief description of Kenyan people.
- The preamble should capture the ownership of the document by the people of Kenya.

5.3.2 DIRECTIVE PRINCIPLES OF STATE POLICY

- The constitution should state that Kenya should remain a multi party sovereign state.
- The constitution should provide for Kenya shall always remain a republic
- The constitution should state clearly that Kenya is a sovereign state.
- The constitution should provide for the preservation of peace, love and progress as a duty of the government.
- The constitution should be sensitive to the needs of the people.
- The constitution should provide for the establishment of a welfare state.
- The constitution should provide for the strict observation of the doctrine of separation of powers.
- The constitution should secure the rule of law, liberty, justice, respect for human rights, good governance and gender equity.
- The constitution should provide for checks and balances on the three arms of the government.
- Democratic principles should include free and fair elections.
- Democratic principles of clear separation of powers between the three arms of government should be included in the constitution.
- The constitution should protect our independence, improve the living standards of all Kenyans, safeguard the country from external aggression, and make Kenya a better country for future generations.

5.3.3 CONSTITUTIONAL SUPREMACY.

- The constitution should provide that the basis of a constitution should be on god, as the divine and supreme authority in the country.
- The constitution should be the supreme law in the land.
- The constitution should provide for a special sections beyond amending powers of the parliament
- Parliament should amend some parts of the constitution.
- Matters concerning remuneration of members of parliament and extension of the life of parliament should be beyond the amending powers of parliament.
- Parliament should not amend fundamental parts of the constitution.
- The constitution should ensure the supremacy of the constitution and any amendments should be subject to national referendum.
- The public should be involved in constitutional amendment through national referendums.
- Where the 65% requirement is not achievable in parliament, a national referendum should be conducted which should garner a minimum of 65% votes.

5.3.4 CITIZENSHIP

- Anyone born in Kenya should be an automatic citizen.
- The constitution should confer to all persons born of Kenyan parents' automatic and guaranteed Kenyan citizenship.
- The constitution should provide for automatic and guaranteed Kenyan citizenship to only those whose father is Kenyan.
- The constitution should provide for automatic and guaranteed Kenyan citizenship to only those who are born in Kenya
- Kenyan citizenship should be acquired through registration and through naturalization.
- A foreigner who has lived in Kenya for 3 years and with a clean criminal record can also acquire citizenship.
- Spouses of Kenyan citizens regardless of gender should be regarded as automatic citizens.
- The constitution should not provide for automatic and guaranteed Kenyan citizenship to spouses of Kenyan women.
- A child of one parent, regardless of the gender of the parent should be entitled to automatic citizenship.
- The constitution should provide for dual citizenship irrespective of gender provided the person is a Kenyan citizen.
- A child born of one Kenyan parent, who should be the father, should be entitled to automatic citizenship.
- Kenyan citizens should have a right to vote, live anywhere in the country and also have freedom of speech.
- Kenyan citizens should have an obligation to maintain peace.
- Kenyans should have an obligation to serve their country and being mindful of other peoples welfare.
- Kenyans have an obligation to ensue peaceful coexistence and to participate in meaningful development.
- Kenyans have an obligation to keep the rule of law and pay allegiance to the government of the day.
- The rights and obligations of Kenyans should be limited to those who have acquired

citizenship.

- Rights and privileges of a citizen should not be based on the manner on which citizenship was acquired.
- Dual citizenship should be allowed in the constitution (5).
- The constitution should not provide for dual citizenship (8).
- The constitution should provide that citizenship applicants be taxed.
- The constitution should provide foreigners entering the country with visas.
- National Identity cards, passports, Driving Licence and birth certificates should be used as prove of citizenship.
- Identity Cards should be sufficient prove of citizenship (6).
- Passports should be adequate prove of citizenship (2).
- The constitution should provide for the proof of citizenship to be through identity cards and passports (3).

5.3.5 DEFENCE AND NATIONAL SECURITY.

- Disciplined forces should be established in the constitution.
- Military, paramilitary and prisons should be established in the constitution.
- The constitution should provide for the disciplined forces to be entrenched in the constitution
- The constitution should provide training of police on human rights.
- The constitution should provide training of police on constitution
- The constitution should provide for the decentralization of law enforcement agencies.
- Administration police should be abolished and the personnel absorbed into the regular police.
- A Military authority should establish a redress system because the current system does not favour the aggrieved parties.
- A disciplinary panel should be established to maintain discipline in the armed forces.
- The court marshal should deal with discipline forces.
- The constitution should provide that the president should be the commander in chief of the armed forces.

- The constitution should provide that the president be empowered with authority over the armed forces
- The constitution should provide for the president to have power to declare war.
- The president should not have powers to declare war (6).
- The president should not have power to declare war (4).
- The constitution should permit use of extraordinary powers in emergency situation.
- Executive should have authority to invoke emergency powers (6).
- Executive should not have authority to invoke emergency powers. (1)
- Parliament should have authority to invoke emergency powers (1).
- Parliament should have a role in effecting emergency powers.
- Parliament should vet decisions made under emergency conditions.
- Parliament should be consulted while making emergency decisions.
- The constitution should provide that upon declaration of war, it should be reviewed after 7 days by the parliament.

5.3.6 POLITICAL PARTIES.

- The constitution should provide that political parties to play other duties besides political mobilization like building schools.
- Political parties should establish offices at all levels to monitor the distribution of public funds.
- Political parties should initiate development projects and cater for the welfare of their members.
- Political parties should participate in decision-making panels that eventually establish the policies of the government.
- Political parties should be the watchdogs of the ruling parties and participate in public appointments.
- Political parties should conduct civic education to enlighten the public on economic, education and health issues.
- Political parties should foster peace, unity and stability.
- The constitution should regulate the conduct of political parties (10). The constitution should provide easy and straightforward guidelines for the formation, and registration of political parties.
- It should be a requirement in the constitution that all Political parties must get at least 1000signatures in 30% of all districts in Kenya to before they are registered.
- The constitution should not regulate the formation and conduct of political parties (3).
- Each political party should have a minimum of 10 MPs.
- The constitution should limit the number of political parties to nominate equal number of women to parliament
- The number of political parties should not be limited (4).

- Parliamentary candidates should be fluent in English and Kiswahili.
- The constitution should provide for the MPs to be graduates.
- MPs should be morally upright.
- People should have a right to recall non-performing MPs.
- A letter of memorandum signed by 2/3 of registered voters should be sufficient to recall an MP.
- The constitution should provide that MPs be recalled with approval of 52% of all the registered votes.
- The constitution should provide for an establishment of a parliamentary calendar and independent commission to decide on the salaries of mps.
- The constitution should provide that the independent commission to fix salaries of MPs
- A select committee should determine MPs salaries.
- The constitution should provide for MPs to declare their salaries.
- The constitution should provide that the MPs earn a salary, which is a percentage of GDP.
- The constitution should provide for mps with offices in their constituencies to attend to them on particular days.
- The constitution should provide for to go to their constituencies once a month.
- The concept of nominated MPs should be abolished.
- The constitution should provide for nomination of MPs reserved for the disabled and other special interest groups e.g. women.
- The constitution should provide for nomination of MPs be given priority to the

marginalized groups

- The constitution should provide for the increment of nominated of mps to 16.
- The constitution should provide for the MPs to serve for a maximum of 10 years.
- The constitution should guarantee for woman representation in parliament.
- 30% of MPs should be women.
- The constitution should provide for a ministerial appointment from any party thus catering for coalition government.
- The constitution should allow for formation o a government of national unity.
- The constitution should make provisions for the formation of a coalition government.
- The legislature should have two chambers: the senate and the House of Representatives.
- Parliament should have power to remove a president through a vote of no confidence
- Parliament can remove a president due to misconduct and or breach of the constitution.
- Parliament should remove a president from power subject to approval of 65% vote of upper and lower houses.
- The president may veto legislation made by parliament if it goes against the interest of the public (1).
- The president should not have power to veto legislation passed by parliament (10).
- The constitution should provide for a two-chamber parliament. The lower house should comprise of professionals, church leaders and retired civil servants or elders above 60 years from every community who would advise mps and cabinet on important issues.
- The constitution should provide for a bicameral parliamentary system with an upper house of elected mps and a lower house composed of representatives of special interest groups and regions.

- Licensing of private clinics should be reduced
- The government should intensify research on HIV/AIDS vaccine
- The government should increase funding on herbalists striving to discover the HIV/AIDS vaccine

5.3.27 **STATUTORY LAW**

- Rapists should face life imprisonment
- Prostitution should be outlawed

5.3.28 **BILLS**

- The children's bill should be implemented

5.3.29 **GENDER EQUITY**

- Gender equity should be practised in public offices

5.3.30 **TRANSPARENCY/ACCOUNTABILITY**

- All public institutions should be audited and findings made public
- Transparency should be applied in dealing with all government projects

5.3.31 **NATURAL JUSTICE AND THE RULE OF LAW**
