He admitted receiving a payment order which had been dishonestly acquired. His company is also associated with the use of stolen cheques worth (43,354,873.45 in 1990, the said.

The release further stated that this payment order was used by a clearing house at Tema called Royal Bridge Agency of which Fosu is a director. Fosu admitted that he instructed another director, George Ayeh, to use this cheque to clear goods belonging to an importer who meither owned nor had purchased this instrument.

VOTERS REGISTER TO RE-OPEN FEB 1992

THE National Commission for Democracy (NCD) will re-open the Voters Register by February, next year to prepare the country towards constitutional rule.

This confirms the announcement by the Head of State and Chairman of the PNDC, Fit-Lt J. J. Rawlings in his new year message to Ghanaians on January I, this year.

Disclosing this to newsment at his office in Accravesterday, Professor E. A. Haizel, Secretary to the NCD, stated however-that the re-opening of the Register would be subjected to the outcome of deliberations of the Consultative Assembly on the next stage of District Level Elections (DLE) to be organised in March, next year.

The voters register was last opened in 1987.

Prof Haizelsaid since the legal term of office of the District Assembly members expires in March 1992, there is the need to organise the elections since it falls in line with the proposals of the Committee of Experts on the Draft Constitution for the Consultative Assembly.

He announced the formation of a special NCD Task Force which would prepare modalities for the successful conduct of a nation-wide referendum on the outcome of all deliberations on the draft proposals submitted by the

A TWO-WEEK soccer jamboree, spread over five Italian towns of Montecatini, Viarreggio, Carrara, Massa and Livorno, ends this evening in Florence with two survivors of an initial 16, robbing nerves for the ultimate prize.

The starting line-up had youths from Italy, Spain, Germany, Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Mexico, the U.S. Cuba, Congo, Sudan, Ghana, the United Arab Emirates, China, Qatar and Australia representing all the six continental confederations affiliated to FIFA.

All the youths descended on Italy with a common will to mark a priceless phase of their education in world's greatest game — soccer.

Some ambitions got shatterd early. After the preliminaries, the list was halved, Italy, China, Congo, Mexico, Sudan, the Emirates, Cuba and Uruguay all dropped out, some with regrettable consequences.

Italy's much-hyped passion for football has been proved to be solely limited to big names but the hosts early fall-out also contributed greatly to their near aversion for youth football as being observed here.

The biggest attendance recorded so far has been the opening match between Italy and the United States. It pulled 4,100 fans but after that poor Italian opener, the attendance has been between 500 and 1,500 on the average.

An important ingredient has thus been An important ingredient has thus been missing in this tournament — the crowd effect that lifts player spirit and nourishes the game. But members of the Ghanaian group here have filled the void to their own advantage, drumning and singing ceaselessly when their boys take

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

Referendum On Constitution

The Leader of the Revolution stated that the PNDC is interested in a constitution which will provide guarantees of freedom, justice, pe ce and stability for the people and not a document that will seek to provide for peace and stability of a government.

On women, he said since they constitute a majority of Ghana's population-their dynamism in our socio-economic life, key role in ensuring domestic stability and prosperity and their role in the production of life itself makes it inexcusable and undemocratic to be marginalised in the nation's affairs.

He said the need for constitutional recognition of this issue has been highlighted in the report of the Committee of Experts and expressed the hope that the Assembly would deliberate further measures that would give women in Ghana equality of opportunity and equal participation in the social and political decision making as well as the right of children for responsible parenthood since it is a self-generating value which helps to provide responsible citizens.

The Leader of the Revolution further said the achievements so far recorded have been made within the framework of structures which are provisional and that the inauguration of the assembly represents the final stages of the processes of phasing out the provision structures in order to ensure the continuity of the advances made and certainly not to return to the previous situation.

continuity of the advances made and certainly not to return to the previous situation.

Earlier, members of the assembly and the Speaker, Pe Ayagitam II, the Chiana Pio, were sworn in before His Lordship, Mr Justice P. E. N. K. Archer, the Chief Justice.

At the first sitting on Tuesday, when the assembly elected Mr Justice Hayfron-Benjamin, Chairman of the Ghana Law Commission as Deputy Speaker and also appointed a 25-member committee of selection to deal with all subject matters of the constitutional proposals, almost all members wanted their voices to be heard and that made the work of the Speaker a bit difficult.

The deliberations were characterised by so many points of order, each of them trying hard to eatch the attention of the speaker.

The Speaker of the House, a soft-spoken man in his late fifties, however was able to steer affairs with short and precise answers which saved a lot of time.

He was not however happy about the attitude of the women assembly members, most of whom looked on as observers while their male counterparts 'scrambled' to dominate proceedings.

"The situation might not change urless something is done," he emphasised.

He advised journalists, especially editors, to endeavour not to please politicians of the day since it is the same people who will disregard them in the end.

The former editor said what journalists must do is to seek the truth and report accurately without having the notion of pleasing anybody.

He said they have the right to criticise and expose corruption in the society.

Mr O. B. Amankwaa, a veteran journalist called on the government to privatise the media houses.

called on the government to privatise the media houses. He said as far as the newspaper industry is in the hands of the government, it will always seek to manipulate it.

Rawlings Signs Public And Political Party Office Holders Law

THE Chairman of the PNDC, FIT. Lt. Jerry John Rawlings, has signed another law, the Public and Political Party Office Holders Law (Declaration of Assets and Eligibility) in Accra.

An official statement issued in Accra last night by the Ministry of Information said the law stipulates that certain categories of PNDC appointees including all PNDC Members and Secretaries who have held office at any time since December 31, 1981 are to declare their properties or assets in respect of the period of office held or upon cassing office.

In the case of PNDC appointees who have ceased

Declared assets are to be made to the Auditor-General, and these shall be published in the Gazette within 14 days of submission.

THE Political Parties Law 1992, setting out the regulations for the formation and conduct of political parties has been promulgated by the PNDC.

An official statement issued in Accra last night by the Ministry of Information said the Interim National Electoral Commission (INEC) will register all political parties under the Law.

The Law deals with the registration of political parties and stipulates among others that no party shall be formed on ethnic, regional, professional or religious basis, or use words, slogans or symbols which could

arouse ethnic, regional, professional or religious divisions.

It states that every citizen of voting age has the right to participate in political activity and that anyone who suppresses or attempts to suppress the lawful political activity of another person is guilty of an offence punishable by law.

On the method of registration of a political party, the law stipulates that an application is to be made to the Interim National Electoral Commission accompanied by the following: (a) Two copies of the constitution and rules and regulations of the party. (b) A list of the full names and addresses of at least one founding member from each district, and (c) A full description of the

identifying symbols, slogans and colours of the party. The Electoral Commission shall within seven days after the receipt of an application issue the political party with a provisional certificate of registration. A final certificate will be issued after the provisions of the law have been fully complied with.

The Interim National Electoral Commission shall not register a political party unless it is satisfied amongs: others that its constitution, rules or regulations conferm to democratic principles as provided in the constitution approved at the referendum held on April 28, 1992.

World Population To Hit 6 Billion Mark In 1998, Says UNFPA Report

THE World Population will be 5.48 billion by mid-1992. It will reach six billion in 1998. Annual additions to world population in the next decade will average 97 million.

These facts are contained in this year's state of the World Population report which is published annually by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

The 46-page report entitled "A world in Balance", said nearly all of this population growth will be in Africa, Asia and Latin America.

The report calls for immediate and determined action to balance population, consumption and development patterns to put an end to absolute poverty to provide for human needs and yet protect the environment.



With the admission of MPL, the total number of listed companies on the GSE now stands at 13.

The Metalloplastica Ghana Ltd has a total outstanding shares of 6,000,000 with 48 per cent being held by its foreign principal and the remaining 52 per cent by Ghanaians.

The financial position based on its the inflancial position based on its annual report for the year ended March 31, 1990 states that net profit of the company before tax stood at C106.8 million while net profit after tax was C40.1 million.

The stated capital of the company C75 million with net assets of C129.6

ASSESSMENT SURVE ON AGRO-FORESTRY STARTS

Abugri, Kpaguri

... In Upper West Region

FIELD surveys are underway in the Upper West Region to assess the level of acceptance of agro-forestry as a farming practice among local farmers and the impact of the practice on agricultural production where it has been adopted

by farmers. Agro-forestry which involves inte grating tree planting into crop and livestock production has been recommended to local farmers as the most viable strategy for solving wi-despread problems of soil erosion, nitrogen-deficient

livestock fodder.

As part of the Wa District Survey, the Deputy Secretary for the region, Mr Simon Abingya who is also the chairman of the Regional Agroforestry Committee at the weekend led members of the committee, comprising heads of department under the Ministry of Agriculture, representatives of some Non-Governmental Organisations and forestry officials on a tour of agro-forestry projects at Kpaguri, Dokpong and Guli in the Wa District.

At Kpaguri, the committee inspected

soils and shortage of an agro-forestry farm under which thousands of fast-growing trees provide fodder for sheep and goats which in turn provide manure for high yielding crop and vegeta-

ble production.

The Deputy Secretary urged the
Ministry of Agriculture to encourage farmers to study the project and adopt it as a model for local livestock and crop

livestock and crop production.
He said the efficient management of the agroforestry farm by its owner, Mr Bob Loggah, was worthy of high commendation and of emulation by local farmers faced with replains of noor soils and oroblems of poor soils and ow crop yields. At Dokpong where agri-

culturists and local farmers are engaged in a wide range of agricultural research experiments, the committee inspected demonstration farms on which various crops including cowpea, millet and groundnuts have been intercropped with plants and trees for high yields.

At Guli which is known as an "iorchard town" because of the large number of mango trees in the town, the committee inspected

portions of several meta-res of mange and cashew being cultivated by local farmers with an initial "Africa 2000" grant of

C700,000.

The grant is in recognition of the environmental conservation efforts of the people of the town who have already established a kilometre square mango plantation in addition to the large numbers of mango trees within the town.

The Field O-ordinator of the Regional Agroforestry Programme, Mr K. K. Yarah, told newsmen

the region this season.

Apart from the immense benefits to be derived by local farmers in terms of increased livestock and crop production, he said agro-forestry is expected to further raise farmers' annual incomes through the sale of fruits.

He said the field surveys are being extended to the Lawra, Tumu, Jirapa-Lambussie and Nadawli districts.

Pharmacy Board Alerts Public

THE Pharmacy Board on Monday, cautioned the public against the use of a mixture of chloroform and water being sold on the market as a cure for constipation and cough.

A statement issued in Acra by the board said, certain individuals are selling the mixture, which is also supposed to clear the lungs of smokers, to the public especially at lorry parks and the markets.

The board said, the mixture has no beneficial therapeutic value but rather has an anaesthetic effect due to its chloroform content and may produce drowsiness in users.

It therefore, advised the public to report peddlers of the mixture to the board or the nearest police station.

It also warned peddlers to stop selling the product or face the law. — GNA

He said building materials are known through studies to contain radon and emit various degrees of radon gas which is toxic, adding that the degree of toxicity depends on the le-vel of the element in the material.



Such points as Dr Tutu raised in connection with the country's BOP needed more analysis instead of drawing conclusions by going just behind the "balances."

As for borrowing, even one of the top three economic powers has had to go on Marshal aid during some period in her history. Today, the USSR is literary on its knees looking for funds to borrow. In the case of Ghana, an important consideration is the fact that since 1988, our debt service ratio has declined and has been programmed to decline further to a minimum acceptable level. Moreover, borrowed funds have been applied to sectors and activities which will lead to the generation of sustained development at a rate which will lead to the generation of sustained development at a rate which will lessen our need for external credits in the future.

A point was made during the symposium that the minimum wage in Ghana is less than \$1, which at the official exchange rate means \$370. In fact, this ragument has featured consistently in statements issued by the so-called opposition group. It sounds nice in the ear but does not really help in advancing scientific arguments about our economy. By the way, the consolidated salary of the lowest paid in the civil service is \$450 per diem. In any case, translations of cedi incomes into dollars are not very useful. Using today's exchange rate to translate salaries in Ghana into dollars may show that our incomes are low as compared to other economies in the region. If the government decides tomorrow to revalue the cedi back to 2.75 to the dollar, without any real effort, Ghanaians would automatically become the highest paid in the world. Perhaps, this is the type of exchange rate policy which those who condemn the present exchange rate regime will go for. Such a choice will only be the result of partial analysis.

analysis.

Another issue which attracted critical comment was the country's inflationary trends. It was argued by some that the deceleration in inflation this year could be attributed to the benevolence of nature which has made food abundant and cheap. And yet in that same presentation however, it was claimed that poor performance of agriculture was an indication of the failure of government policy! The inconsistency aside, poor and good rains showed up both during the ERP period and the period prior to it. 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

At The Trial Of Kwame Safo-Adu

DR Kwame Safo-Adu, executive chairman of the Industrial Chemical the Industrial Chemical Laboratories Limited (ICL) has said that in converting his private laboratory in East Legon in Accra to produce pharmaceutical products on commercial basis, he sought advice as to its suitability from the Registrar of the Pharmacy Board.

He said it was based on the recommendation of the Registrar that ICL began temporary production at the East Legon laboratory.

Dr Safo-Adu, who is on

the East Legon laboratory.

Dr Safo-Adu, who is on trial for allegedly misapplying foreign loans advanced to ICL and for economic sabotage, however dismissed the converver dismissed the convertion of the prosecution that in relation to the suitability or otherwise of the use of a laboratory for production, the Pharmacy Board has a role to play in that.

He told the tribunal that the advice ICL sought; from the Registrar was a private one and that other similar agencies were con-

"Seeking advice is not the same as saying that you are bound by it or that the law demands it", he said, adding that "this was a peculiar emergency si-tuation."

The accused rejected a The accused rejected a suggestion from the prosecution that since the East Legon laboratory was not built for large scale operations, it was unsafe to use it for commercial purposes.

Questioned on when he first met the Registrar, the accused could not readily

first met the Registrar, the accused could not readily say when, but told the tribunal that he invited him sometime in April 1984, by which time the ICL had installed machimes at the East, Legon premises prior to starting production.

Asked what the Registrar came to do, Dr Safo-Adu said he was invited in order to, seek his opinion as to the suitability of the laboratory for commercial usage.

The accused rejected a suggestion from the prosecution that the Registrar came to the East Legon premises in 1988 at the invitation of Kwamena Bartels, a director of ICL, who is jointly charged with the accused.

Dr Safo-Adu, in dismis ing the suggestion, told the tribunal that the ICL was in 1988 producing at the Pharce Laboratories in When the accused's attention was drawn to the fact that records indicate that ICL started production in 1983 and therefore if the Registrar visited the If the Registrar visited the East Legon premises in 1988, then the Pharmacy Board had no knowledge of the existence of the company until then, the accused maintained that that cannot be the case.



Assembly Considers Report On The Media

THE Consultative Assembly at its thirty-eighthsitting in Accra yesterday unanimously adopted for consideration the report on the Freedom and Independence of the Media, presented to the House by the Committee on the Rights of the People.

The report was, however, adopted after a lengthy debate on its general formulations and principles.

It also advocates the establishment of a Natio-nal Media Commission to promote and ensure the freedom and independence of the media, among other

things.
The 12-member Media Commission, according to the report shall consist of one representative each nominated by the Ghana Bar Association, publish-ers and owners of private press, training institutions of journalists and communicators, Ghana Association of Writers, Ghana Library Board, the Public Relations Association of Ghana and the Ghana Advertising Association. The Ministry of Information would also be represented on the Commission while Parliament can also prescribe other bodies to serve on it. of journalists and commu

Two persons shall be nominated by the Ghana Journalists Association while the President shall appoint two other persons, one of whom shall be a woman'to the Commission. Moving for the adoption

Moving for the adoption of the report, Mr Yaw Osafo Maafo, representing the Ghana Institute of Engineers and Chairman of the Committee observed that any successful attack on human rights starts with the suppression of the freedom of the press.

Background Document From WHO For Accra Forum

DESPITE decades of development, a combidevelopment, a compi-nation of newly emerg-ing health hazards threaten to plunge the globe into an "unmana-geable" health crisis, the World Health Orga-nisation (WHO) has warned warned.

This is contained in a new analysis by the WHO entitled, "Health dimen-sions of economic reform". The publication will be used as a background do-cument for the International Forum on Health scheduled to open at the Accra International Conference Centre today, De-cember 4.

It notes that the emergence of health hazards in the industrialised countries, continued prevalence of malnutrition and epidemic diseases in developing countries as well as the AIDS pandemic necessitate urgent global action.

The three-day forum on the theme, "Health: a con-ditionality for economic development", will seek to tackle the health crises through policy changes on-how to break the cycle of poverty and inequity



According to Dr Hirosin
Nakajima, DirectorGeneral of WHO, "the industrial world is becoming
aware of the magnitude of
the health hazards resulting from industrialisation
and poor lifestyles."

At the same time, Dr Nakajima says in an intro-duction to the document. that many developing countries carry a double burden which threatens to become overwhelming.

While they struggle to cope with poverty, as well as malnutrition, diarrhoeal diseases, respiratory infec-tions, AIDS, malaria and

other illnesses, they also face a rising health crisis associated with industria-

THE report on the Freedom and Independence of THE report on the Freedom and Independence of the Media was virtually put on the carpet at the 42nd sitting of the Consultative Assembly in Accra yesterday when three out of six amendment motions that came up for debate were endorsed by the House.

One of the motions was rejected by concensus while one was withdrawn upon consultation and advice.
